Don't Hide Your Pride

Overview

Students will recognize how their attitude toward school and their school work will affect their education.

ASCA Standards

AD.A1.2: Display a positive interest in learning

• AD.A1.3: Take pride in work and achievement

Materials

Respect and Pride Assessment
Respect and Pride Role Play Cards
Scenario Cards
Character Outcomes

Approximate Time: 30 minutes

Procedures

- 1. Divide the class into small groups.
- 2. Explain to the students: The way we behave in class has a direct impact on our achievement. When kids show pride in their work, then they are more likely to succeed. When kids show apathy toward what they do, it is reflected in their work.
 - a. How can you tell if you are showing pride in your work?
 - b. How can you tell if your behavior is helping you achieve your academic goals?
- 3. Distribute the Respect and Pride Role Play Cards to the groups. Here are the following "parts:"
 - a. The Engaged Learner: The person who is involved and tries
 - b. The Doubting Learner: The person who thinks their work is never good enough

- **c.** The Lack-of-Interest Learner: The person who shrugs and nods to avoid answering questions
- d. The La-La-Land Learner: The person who goofs off and thinks that the whole day of school is a play time
- **e.** The Off-Topic Learner: The person who wants to only talk about one subject (Sports, Music, etc) and shows no interest unless it is about their favorite subject
- 4. Each group will then act out a scenario; the rest of the class will have to guess which role the individual students played. The counselor will read the scenario to the class to "set up the scene."
- 5. After the students guess which roles were played by whom, the class must predict what will happen to the students.
 - **a.** After predictions, those in the role play will read the "How the Story Ends" portion of their card to tell what ended up happening to their characters.
 - After the events transpired, which characters had success?
 - Which characters would have an undesirable outcome?
- 6. Discussion Questions:
 - a. How did behavior impact performance?
 - b. How does it feel to succeed? Why might some people not take pride in their work?
 - c. If you were not happy with your academic performance, what steps could you take to change?
 - d. When you display interest in your school work, what are potential outcomes?
- 7. Distribute the Respect and Pride Assessment.

Data

Quantitative: 90% of the students will be able to identify how behavior impacts performance; students will indicate the importance of taking pride in their work.

Optional Lesson Extensions

(adding five to ten minutes to a lesson)

- 1. **Self-Assessment**—Have the students write down what kind of learner in the classroom they think they are; have them describe if that is the type of learner they want to be and what they need to do to change. If they are happy with the type of learner they are, have them indicate what they should do to maintain their learning style.
- 2. **Find in Text**—Have the students discuss which characters from various books fit into the different roles; what happens to those characters in their stories?
